

### Dearest Friends,

Advent and Christmas are among the most sacred of seasons: the beginning of our liturgical year; an ancient celebration of the return of the light from the longer nights of autumn/winter; and most significantly, a time of reflection during which we prepare for the birth of the Christ Child over 2000 years ago, and wait in prayerful anticipation of the return of the Messiah.

The season of Advent is a sacred opportunity for the contemplation of God's love. We celebrate the aspects of our human and divine natures, both our imperfections and God's perfect spirit within us. Tradition holds that we light a candle for each of the four Sundays of Advent. Each candle focuses on an aspect of that divine nature, of what comes into the world through Christ's birth: Hope. Peace. Joy. Love.

These are expressions of our divinity that we are called to share with each other as outward gestures manifesting God's grace. This year, as we create more opportunities for gathering as a community at First Church in a post-pandemic world, I look forward to sharing in these activities with you and your children so that we can count down to Christmas together - not a countdown to presents, but a countdown to Jesus coming to us as the light of the world.

As you hear the stories of the prophets and the birth narratives of Jesus over the coming weeks, listen closely. We have heard them dozens of times over the course of our lives, so sometimes we may miss parts of what is being proclaimed:

"The story of Christmas begins under the rule of an oppressive Roman government; the incarnation of God happens through an unmarried teenager, in a small town, birthed in a barn, witnessed by shepherds (at the bottom of the social ladder), completely under the radar of political & religious authorities. This is the theme that will continue through Jesus' life. Jesus washes dirty feet, befriends women and tax collectors, embraces lepers. God does not work through the established channels to transform the world. It is the poor and the marginalized who bring the good news." (Peter Sawtell, Eco-Justice Ministries)

How are we each being called to be a light to the world? I am so grateful to be embarking on this 2022 Advent journey with you, particularly with our children leading the way to Christmas through their joy, their courage, their excitement, & their hope, as we prepare for Jesus!

# MELCOME




We welcome Ariana Hones to the Pastoral

welcome her to the community.


We welcome Albert Faustini to the Pastoral
