

#### A Letter From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

Thank God for faith. Thank God for hope.

In the Letter to the Hebrews 11:1 we find the foundational words:

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

We live in a time that tries and tests us: the devastation of the Coronavirus pandemic; the destructive effects of a warming planet; the fact that one in six children lives in extreme poverty; the rich get richer and the poor get poorer by the day; the ongoing ravages of systemic racism; our democracy in extreme danger of failing; and our personal troubles, losses and grief.

No wonder it is tempting to give in to despair and nihilism. This is why I thank God for faith and hope.

Faith is trusting in God. Hope is trusting that God will show us more. These are the antidotes to the despair and nihilism that threaten to overtake us. They are the well springs of our emotional health and most especially of our spiritual well being.

You may remember Amanda Gorman, who read her poem "The Hill We Climb" at the 2020 Inauguration. In reflecting on the difficulties of the last year, she wrote a column in the New York Times:

Even as we've grieved, we've grown; even fatigued we've found that this hill we climb is one we must mount together. We are battered, but bolder; worn, but wiser. I'm not telling you to not be tired or afraid. If anything, the very fact that we're weary means we are, by definition, changed; we are brave enough to listen to, and learn from, our fear. This time will be different because this time we'll be different. We already are.

And yes, I still am terrified every day. Yet fear can be love trying its best in the dark. So do not fear your fear. Own it. Free it. This isn't a liberation that I or anyone can give you — it's a power you must look for, learn, love, lead and locate for yourself.

Why? The truth is, hope isn't a promise we give. It's a promise we live. Tell it like this, and we, like our words, will not rest..

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen."

Here's to living in 2022 with a Hope that is a promise we live!

Join the Community Emergency Response Team!

The CERT disaster training course begins Saturday, February 26th and runs for five consecutive Saturdays from 8 am – 2 pm. This free, annual training prepares people to help themselves and their community in the event of a major emergency or disaster. Attendees are trained in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, disaster psychology, disaster medical operations as well as shelter operations. The CT Division of Emergency Management, Homeland Security, and FEMA developed the training and upon completion of the course, participants are eligible, and invited to join the Fairfield CERT Team.

The CERT team mission is to assist first responders during emergencies and disasters under the direction of the Fairfield Fire Chief who is the town Emergency Manager. "We know disasters can happen at any time, and take different forms – hurricanes, blizzards, flooding, shootings, chemical spills, and that the key to a rapid response is having trained personnel available to help. Our trained CERT Volunteers play a vital role and multiply our manpower capabilities during a crisis," said Deputy Fire Chief Kyran Dunn, Fairfield Emergency Management and CERT Coordinator.

During Super Storm Sandy, Fairfield CERT assisted nearly 300 residents through our efforts managing and operating the municipal shelter at Ludlow High School. Shelter operations for people and pets continues to be a major part of the mission and training for the team. The CERT team regularly supports the town with traffic and pedestrian control for major events including the Fairfield Half-Marathon and the Fourth of July Celebration.



### Operation Hope Update from Church Council

Recently, there have been multiple news articles and TV news reports regarding Operation Hope receiving a \$1.5 million state-approved bond to go toward funding a new building.

Given that Operation Hope is our tenant at 636 Old Post Road, this news prompts certain questions and, therefore, Church Council would like to provide an Operation Hope update to the congregation.

#### **General Operation Hope Lease Information**

- Operation Hope (OH) signed a 20-year lease with First Church which commenced October 1, 2007 and expires December 31, 2027.
- OH has the right to terminate their lease but must provide First Church with one (1) year's advance notice.
- The building at 636 Old Post road is a total of 10,734 square feet including 4,763 sq. ft. in the basement, 4,989 sq. ft. on the first floor and 982 sq. ft. on the 2nd floor. OH pays annual rent of \$92,250 per year or \$15.45 per square foot on an annual basis (excluding the basement square footage). We believe this rental rate is well below a market rental rate if the space were to become vacant.

#### **Operation Hope Space Needs**

- At 636 Old Post Road, Operation Hope operates a significant food pantry that provides food for the needy four (4) days a week. They provide over 123,000 meals per year and serve 1,000 area households per year.
- At 636 Old Post Road, there is a full basement floor used for mostly canned and dry food storage, a full first floor with offices, workstations and a conference room and a partial second floor used mostly for office storage.
- Operation Hope also has space at 50 Nichols Street owned by the Town of Fairfield near the Fairfield Police Station. That space houses OH's homeless resource center and community kitchen and is where lunch and dinner is served 5 days a week.
- On multiple occasions from 2020-2021, Operation Hope has communicated to Church Council their expectation that they would not be able to continue to lease the 50 Nichols location indefinitely and their optimal desire and need would be to have one building sizable enough to encompass all of their uses within 636 Old Post Road and 50 Nichols Street (i.e. all OH services under one roof). In OH's communications, they estimated that they would need at least an additional 4,000 square feet beyond their existing square footage at 636.
- In response to OH's need for more space, we toured OH through areas of 148 Beach Road which could be
  potentially subdivided for their use in addition to their remaining at 636; however, their interest in having all their
  services and space uses under one roof (and not part of a campus of buildings) continues as a top priority and
  that priority seems only more bolstered with the recent approval of the \$1.5 million state bond.



• While we understand that OH has inquired with the Town's Historic District Commission and Planning & Zoning regarding possibly adding a floor at 636, that prospect involves historic architectural requirements, a zoning variance and a myriad of Town approval processes that are challenging. It also does not provide for their ability to additionally grow in the future.

#### **Next Steps with Operation Hope**

- Church Council has been in communication with OH in the past week and OH has confirmed that they have not
  purchased a new building location but that they have been searching in Fairfield. They have agreed to keep
  Council apprised of any new developments regarding their search and to meet with Council in January related to
  the 636 location. Also, since the bond announcement last week, both OH and First Church have begun receiving
  inquiries from groups interested in occupying 636.
- During our communications with OH in 2021 and recently, OH has provided us with their assurance that it should take approximately 2 years for them to vacate 636 if they find a new building that suited their needs.


