

A Letter From the Pastor

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

What does that mean, to be "in Christ"?



It seems to me that to be in Christ is to be my true self; to have my relationship with Christ as the center point from which all other relationships flow.

In a very real way, God is relationship. Divinity is essentially relational. I remember my beloved Grandmother answering my question about why God created us with her wise words, "Because God was lonely." This is profound theology, I think.

God desires me, God desires you, God wants to live in friendship with us.

Franciscan priest and mystic Richard Rohr writes:

When we live from our true self in God, religion is not about requirements; it's about relationship, the quality and capacity of our relatedness to God and others.

What gets in the way of that relationship? Our human propensity for rules, requirements, rewards and punishments creates fear, resentment, and resistance in our hearts. It is hard for us to accept that God simply wants to be in relationship with us, to love us, and that we do not need to earn, warrant, or merit that friendship with God. We set up rules that we can never fulfill and then conclude that God does not love us – even wants to punish us - because of our "failure."


Rohr goes on:

In relationship with God ... we're not being manipulated, we're not being used, we're not being judged, we're not being evaluated. Who wouldn't want to go there? It's the place of ultimate freedom. It's the state that every one of us wants to live in. That's why we tell people to go pray for some set time each day, because when we do, we slowly learn to live in this place.

I want to say as strongly as I can that all of the elements and practices of religion exist to help us experience this essential and united self. Pure and simple. That's all.

Please give yourself permission during Lent – Ash Wednesday is March 2! – to pay attention to your true self, to live in Christ. I would love to chat with you about this. Please give me a call at 203-414-0496 so we can set aside some time to do that, okay?

 list.












One Book, One Congregation








Join the Festival Choir for Holy Week & Easter

Greetings, Siblings in Christ!

I write to you with a brief update about my life and calling. As you may know, I began my studies at Yale Divinity School in Fall 2018. After taking a medical leave to attend to my health while being treated for Lyme Disease, I returned to my studies last spring. I continued through this fall semester, and I'm very happy to report that I finished my coursework in December and will graduate at the end of May with my Master of Arts in Religion degree. I began my time at Yale with the intention of discerning whether I was being called to ordained ministry in the UCC, and I entered into a covenant with First Church and the Fairfield East Association as a Member in Discernment. After many months of prayer and conversation with trusted mentors and friends, I decided to withdraw from that process as I have discerned that I am being called to direct-service work in the nonprofit sector. In January, I started working in the clinical team at Operation Hope as a case manager. I am so excited for what's in store in the coming months, and I know that my theological education from YDS has prepared me well for this work.
