

A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I am writing to you, having just finished our Ash Wednesday worship on Zoom. It was truly a wonderful worship experience, highlighted by the duet of Middle Roader Louisa Hain and Student Pastor Heidi Butler singing "Amazing Grace."

When you receive this letter we will be a couple of weeks into Lent. Lent reminds us of Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness after his baptism. When Jesus returned from the wilderness he proclaimed, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the Good News." (Mark 1:15) When we hear the word "repent" it can conjure up all sorts of feelings and images, many of them negative, painful, and dehumanizing. But repentance really means "turn around... re-center yourself... become oriented to God... reconnect with God... see the kingdom, the love of God, all around you."

Connie Kristy shared with me the words she saw many years ago on a billboard outside a little church in the Carolinas, "If God seems far away, who moved?"

Like Jesus' wilderness experience, "we can use Lent to reconnect with God and the fullness of our own humanity – the good and the bad – in some intentional way" writes the Franciscan priest, Fr. Richard Rohr. I believe that Jesus is inviting us to give up something this Lent. Not giving up chocolate, or some such thing. Deeper than that.

Let's give up wandering away from God. Let's stop moving away from God, and instead turn around (repent) and move toward God. To do that let's stop thinking that God is harsh and judgmental, just waiting to catch us in sin, so God can punish us.

That, my friends, is not the Good News. The Good News is that you are the object of God's desire; God wants nothing more than to be in a loving, reciprocal relationship with you. God is love and is reaching out to you in love all the time.

All we have do is turn around and move toward God, who will jump up like the father of the "prodigal son" to welcome us home. That is the Good News of Lent.

A Note From Frank

Dear First Church Community,

It is an honor and a joy to become your next Director of Music, about six weeks from now. Through conversations with the search committee and the staff, I learned about the congregation's past and present, as well as its future plans, hopes, and aspirations. I look forward to hearing more as my wife Heather and I get to know many of you this spring. I have gotten acquainted with your community a little bit through the years, as a guest musician almost a decade ago, as an organ recitalist in 2017, and through attending and helping to produce the many events the Greater Bridgeport Chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO) has hosted here.

I'm a native of New Rochelle, NY, and have spent my adult life living in New Haven, Manhattan, Bridgeport, and now Fairfield. Heather and I purchased a house in the Brooklawn neighborhood in 2019. I've been a professional church musician for about 27 years, including 7 years serving at the former St. Paul's Lutheran in Bridgeport. I'm in my sixteenth year of teaching music and music education at the University of Bridgeport, where I'm currently department chair. I recently stepped down as conductor of the Mystic River Chorale after 13 seasons. Before I began Ph.D. studies in 2010, I taught high school music, mainly in the New Haven Public Schools; urban education is a major part of my research agenda.

Throughout the search process, I was struck by the vibrant, justice-focused, service-oriented, welcoming nature of your congregation. These attributes are very important to me. I come to you from a similar community on the Upper West Side of Manhattan, Advent Lutheran Church, where I have served for eight years, and worshipped for ten years. Advent is a friendly, bilingual church known by many in the neighborhood for its feeding ministries and its concert series. I have loved my time there, but the commute has become impractical, and limited the extent of my involvement in the community.

Corporate worship is the center of our life together as Christians, and it has been hard this past year not to be together in both time and physical space. How we miss the sound and feel of being part of a large congregation raising their voices in enthusiastic communal song! Such a feeling is why I am a church musician. I am proud of the online services I've helped create at Advent, but I've noticed, when I engage with them as a worshipper, a natural tendency to be a passive recipient of anything I am watching on a screen. This will be one of our great challenges as the church emerges from COVID-19: making sure liturgy lives up to its name, as the work of the people. It's something we do together, as the priesthood of all believers.I look forward to being among you and doing that work with the staff, the leadership, the choir, and each of you.


Lent is a time to contemplate, to return to God, and to consider with seriousness what really matters in our lives of faith.
