A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Ah, "Fall in New England." For many, it's our favorite season. The fields are full of pumpkins and the trees are turning gold and red, the nights are cool and the air is crisp, the apples "snap" when you bite them, fresh from the orchard and the cider is sweeter than ever. (Plus Pumpkin Spice Latte, hot or cold, in every coffee shop!)

We love the sense of homecoming and gathering with people dear to us, the smells and color of fall, and for those who loved school as youngsters, the excitement and promise of a new year.

Even though most of us no longer lead agrarian life, there is also the lingering sense of "harvest home." Don't you remember being thoroughly immersed as a child in the stories of the autumn harvest feast the Wampanoag Native Americans shared with the Pilgrims at Plymouth in 1621? The fall is a time of fall is a time of deep emotion and gratitude. As adults that sense is tempered with profound grief at how quickly the relationship between the English and the Wampanoag people descended into warfare.

Within two generations the Wampanoag population and culture was decimated through European illnesses, warfare, expropriation, and enslavement. It was the beginning of a history of white destruction and violence against Native peoples that continues to this day.

Our town's history mirrors that of Plymouth, as English settlers lead by Roger Ludlowe succeeded in displacing the Paugussett people through violence, war, and expropriation. The land they called Unquowa was renamed Fairfield, in recognition of the fertile fields that had been cleared by the Paugussett, now taken by the English.

It is vitally important that we acknowledge that the land on which we live was taken – forcibly – from the people who had lived here for thousands of years. "Land acknowledgment" is one way to be honest about our history, recognize that our well being is built on other people's suffering, and to be engaged in acts of repentance and reconciliation.

On Sunday, October 10, the day before Indigenous People's Day, we will hold our Second Land Acknowledgment Ceremony at 12 noon on the Front Lawn of the Sanctuary. This is the site of the first building erected by English immigrants in 1639/40 and the right place to gather and speak the names of the people and places that they erased – Unquowa, Dawnland, Turtle Island, Paugusset, Pequot. Please Join us as we gather with Clan Mother Shoran Waupatukuay Piper of the Golden Hill Paugusset Nation to remember, reflect, learn, and commit to working for justice in our community.

- We held our All Church meeting and voted to unanimously approve the sale of the Rowland Road parsonage, and to begin the necessary work on the sanctuary so we can safely worship in there together again. I will share updates on these as they progress. It came to my attention that some members had difficulty accessing the meeting. It is certainly frustrating that there were larger phone issues going on that night, and I apologize. We will continue to do our very best to make sure every member has access to our meetings—in person or virtually.
- The Personnel Board and Interim Pastor Search Committee are in the midst of hosting cottage meetings. From this discernment, we will determine where we feel the Holy Spirit is calling us to go as a church and our pastoral leadership. We are thankful for such thoughtful participation.

All Church Meeting Outcome

The All Church Meeting on September 14 was well attended and carefully considered several vitally important pieces of business. Special thanks to Moderator Jim Muschett for an orderly meeting in which all voices were heard and varying ideas and wisdom shared. It is noteworthy that the vote on each proposal before the meeting was unanimous.

Following a clear and thorough presentation by Steward for Resource Management Craig Way (who has given a great deal of time and professional expertise to this project) members asked insightful questions, shared their experiences with air circulation systems, and offered helpful suggestions.

The proposed electrical upgrade for the entire building complex was approved. The proposed air circulation system (which will also cool the air in summer) with MERV filtration for the 1891 Sanctuary building was amended to include an ultraviolet cleansing system to eliminate viruses. The amended proposal was approved.

The air circulation system as approved will exchange the air in the Sanctuary 6 – 8 times per hour (the current rate is 0 times per hour) and is in keeping with guidance from the Town Department of Public Health to return to the Sanctuary.

Treasurer Jacque Paige and Finance Board Chair Eric Treschuk gave a thorough presentation on the proposed sale of the Parsonage at 127 Rowland Road and Realtor Michael Traum offered his professional opinion on the potential. The proposal to sell the Parsonage was approved.

Two amendments to the ByLaws to provide for the sale and dispossession of real assets were put forward by the Council and approved.

Lastly, and perhaps most important, the meeting agreed to the proposal to join the Interfaith Refugee Resettlement Project (IRRP) to help welcome a family from Afghanistan. This is such a wonderful opportunity to respond to the refugee crisis, working together with Jews, Christians, and Muslims as we live out our identity as a Servant Church.

Every action makes First Church a stronger worshiping and serving community! To God be the glory!



Rooted in LOVE

Our Stewardship theme of "Rooted in Love" draws inspiration from Psalm 1,
"They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season."

The Psalmist invited us to imagine all the good things we can bear when well planted.

What might we give away when rooted in love?

But the Psalmist also meant something deeper. The word we translate as "planted" in English means "transplanted" in Hebrew. This translation speaks to the power of love to move us from one place to another, the power to convert us from one way of life to another. What would need to change in our lives for us to be fully rooted in love?

We might need to make a move from a "mindset of scarcity" to a "mindset of abundance." A scarcity mindset makes us think there will never be enough - we must compete, one against another, because there is not enough to go around. Scarcity thinking names all the things we cannot do, all the things we cannot share. But a mindset of abundance sees the fullness of God's love. Martin Luther King Jr. saw the world abundantly - despite all the injustice he confronted, King knew God's spirit moved through history, creating and renewing community.

King once described the force of love that animated the Civil Rights Movement.




What would it mean for our lives to be rooted in such love?
