


Advent Devotional Project: Help Us Unpack the New First Church Kitchen Wednesdays During Advent at 7 p.m.

"There are some of us who think to ourselves, 'If I had only been there! How quick I would have been to help the Baby. I would have washed His linen. How happy I would have been to go with the shepherds to see the Lord lying in the manger!' Why don't we do it now? We have Christ in our neighbor." — Martin Luther

I think of this quotation every Christmas. Something about Mary and Joseph finding no room at the inn, and the image of baby Jesus being laid in a manger, "no crib for a bed," awakens a sense of empathy in us that we are called to extend to others who are in need now. I went to see Oliver and wished I could fill that little boy's bowl with the extra food he was craving. I know you know the feeling! We imagine that we would have steped in to make room, to prepare a place, to feed someone who is going hungry in another time and place. And yet Jesus has told us that whatever we do for others who are in need now, we do for him. Advent is a time of preparation. For our devotional time this advent season, I am inviting those of you who want to put your hands to work getting ready to feed and welcome one another in the congregation and also our neighbors in the wider community to come together around the new church island and unpack! Let's prepare to respond to the needs here and now in our community. We will begin each evening with a time of devotion and then roll up our sleeves and get to work. Experience the Joy of Music

"Each Christmas, I look forward to hearing two Christmas broadcasts, both on our area NPR stations, WSHU or WNYC: St. Olaf College's St. Olaf Christmas Festival and the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols from King's College, Cambridge, broadcast on Christmas Eve. Check them out!

The classic Sir David Willcocks arrangement of *O Come, All Ye Faithful* is sung each year at King's College Lessons and Carols. It's not Christmas for me until I hear the descant on "Sing, choirs of angels" and the amazing jazz chord on "Word of the father." You'll hear this same arrangement on Christmas Eve at our 10 p.m. Lessons and Carols service.

Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas is my favorite secular carol. First sung by Judy Garland in Meet Me in St. Louis, but for something different, try Ella Fitzgerald's version.

Teaching Kids What Christmas Means

As we guide our children through Advent and the Christmas season, one of the greatest gifts we can give them is a deeper understanding of the true meaning of Christmas: particularly by emphasizing the love, hope, and peace that the birth of Jesus brings into our lives.

Create family traditions that reflect Christ's love: lighting Advent candles at home, reading the Nativity story together, serving others in the community. I also love the First Church Advent devotional! Every year, the Advent devotional is carefully chosen to serve as a meaningful guide for prayer and inspiration during this sacred season.

My favorite aspect of the Christmas story to highlight for children is the miraculous and humble aspects of Jesus' birth: born in a barn, in a small insignificant town, visited by both shepherds and wise men, heralded by angels. The love of God comes through everywhere, in the most unexpected and ordinary of ways.

Our children hold onto the comfort and joy of their family traditions as they grow older. Traditions serve as powerful reminders of what has shaped our family; they become a part of our family's story. Many studies have shown that traditions provide children with a healthy understanding of oneself and continue to build their self-esteem as they grow. Build traditions and rituals that remind our children (and ourselves!) that Christmas is not just about receiving, but about sharing the love of God with all. This is how we nurture a faith that lasts well beyond the season.




Congratulations, Kim Feeney
