

Sunday School classes are known as "Disciple Road" (age 4 through 5th grade) and "Middle Road" (6th grade and up). We also have a children's choir. In Cana at a wedding feast, Christ worked his first great sign. There Jesus' mother told her son, "They don't have any wine!" He called for six stone water jars; they filled them to the brim; Through water changed to wine that day, his friends believed in him.

Far from the town, the crowds pressed in on Jesus' prayer retreat. He healed their sick, then told his own, "You give them food to eat!" Five loaves of bread and two small fish were all they found to share, Yet thousands ate the meal he blessed, with baskets left to spare.

About our guest Social Justice Preacher: The Rev. Marilyn B. Kendrix



The Rev. Marilyn B. Kendrix is a retired Bridge Conference Minister of the Southern New England Conference UCC. Prior to ordination, Marilyn worked for over 15 years as an Organizational Development Consultant principally at AT&T and also in other profit and not-for-profit settings. She served on the Board of Directors of the Connecticut Conference and participated with the Southern New England Conference Planning Team. She also served as the last Conference Minister of the Rhode Island Conference UCC and one of the first Bridge Conference Ministers of the new

Southern New England Conference of UCC.

Marilyn earned her Bachelor's degree from Spelman College, an HBCU school in Atlanta, Georgia, her Executive MBA and an MA in Industrial and Organizational Psychology, both from the University of New Haven. She received her Master of Divinity degree from Yale Divinity School and a certificate from the Yale Institute of Sacred Music.

Since 2012, her personal ministry has included preaching at over 100 churches to raise awareness about mass incarceration in America. In her ministry to seek criminal justice reform, Marilyn co- wrote The Justice Imperative: How Hyper-Incarceration Has Hijacked the American Dream (Significance Press, 2014). Her current social justice preaching ministry addresses systemic racism and the controversy over critical race theory. So far, she has preached at an additional 90 churches on these subjects.

Marilyn retired from the Southern New England Conference in January, 2021 and is married to her best friend, Alan. Together they have 3 children and 6 grandchildren Rev. Kendrix's suggested readings based on today's service and sermon include:
